Dear Families:

As I reach out to you today, at the close of our Spring Break, I hope this letter finds you and your loved ones doing well. I am writing to share some updates and provide you with a sense of what you can expect next week. And, once again, I want to thank you for your continued support and understanding as our community works together through this extremely challenging time.

Update and Guiding Principles

Following the announcement by the Ministry of Education to suspend in-classroom learning on March 17, school district staff have been working diligently, along with the guidance and support from the Ministries of Health and Education, to best provide supports for students, staff, families and our community. The Provincial Government has established four guiding principles that inform our work:

- Maintain a healthy and safe environment for all students, families and employees.
- Provide the services needed to support children of our essential workers.
- Support vulnerable students who may need special assistance.
- Provide continuity of educational opportunities for all students.

Continuity of Learning

The Ministry of Education has asked that school districts put learning opportunities in place no later than mid-April. While we will begin next week, learning opportunities for your student during these extraordinary times will not be the same as their previous classroom experience. Things will be different.

We also recognize that families already face enormous pressures – from worries about the economy, safety and health to name a few. Knowing that the plans moving forward will not fit every family perfectly, we have considered flexibility a key factor. Please know that everything we are creating is with a view to providing a sense of connection, normalcy, and routine that keeps your child engaged in their own education.

After Spring Break, we are taking a phased approach with the immediate focus on connecting with students, gaining valuable insight from our school-based staff, and providing tools for students and families to use at home. To assist families with planning, please find the following timeline:

- Next week, school staff will reach out to and connect with students and their families.
- Also during the week of March 30, you will find details on our district website (<u>www.burnabyschools.ca</u>)
 about access to our newly created Continuing Learning Website. It contains self-directed activities for
 students at home. We will suggest the following initial explorations on the new site for students.
 - **Grades 8 12**: complete the online module "Digital Citizenship Quest". Much of the work going forward will take place through technology. This module will help build an understanding of each of our roles in a digital environment, including how to stay safe, as well as how to be a caring and productive member of any digital community. Whether students are socializing with friends, playing video games, or working on a school assignment, this is an important life skill in a technological age.
 - Kindergarten Grade 7: explore activities by grade level on the Continuing Learning Site.
- You will receive additional information with links to access our new learning website next week.

Connections and relationships are at the heart of everything we do in the Burnaby School District. While COVID-19 has dramatically changed how we all reach out to one another, it cannot take away from the importance of

relationships and the powerful connection between students and teachers. We thank you in advance for your patience next week, as our school staff reach out to our 25,000 students and their families.

Unique Needs and Essential Service Workers Survey

We have a number of families whose children have unique learning needs and/or who may not have access to technology. We are looking at these considerations as well as what special supports might be needed for our families.

I would also like to take a moment here to acknowledge the incredible efforts of our essential service workers in our community. Their work is critical to the health and well-being of us all. The Ministry of Education is working closely with the Ministry of Children and Family Development to ensure children of essential service workers have access to care. The Burnaby School District partners with several on-site childcare programs and is working collaboratively with them to provide services for these families.

All of our families have been sent an email asking essential service workers in our district who need on-site childcare to complete the survey as soon as possible. You can access it here and on our website.

Supporting Your Student

We recognize that the changes and disruptions brought by COVID-19 to all our lives are unsettling. As we move forward, you may feel that your child is finding it difficult to focus on learning. Please know that our intention is to provide resources and activities that can be used in a way that best suits your family.
